Annual General Meeting

Our 1999 AGM was held at the Pigeon House on Sat 6th March. Before the meeting, Helen Perry led a tour of the power station. It has the distinction, when opened in 1903, of being the first *in the world* to distribute three-phase electricity. Various additions between 1933 and 1940 brought its capacity up to 95MW. The station, which was coal burning, closed in 1976, being superseded by the adjoining Poolbeg Station.

As many of you will know, the Pigeon House Trust, formed in 1997, has ambitious plans to turn this station into a multi-use venue, including an Irish Museum of Science and Technology. The Trust would welcome your support to secure the site and advance its ideas. Contact Helen Perry to express your interest.

After an excellent lunch kindly supplied by Helen and her colleagues, the AGM commenced. A copy of the secretary's report and audited accounts for 1998 are in this mailshot. William Dick, Michael Coulter and Paul Duffy stepped down from the committee due to pressure of work. Our thanks to them for their contribution to the Association since its foundation. We welcome Colm Donnelly, co-ordinator of the Mullycovet Mill project and organiser of the forthcoming Milling Conference, and also Robert Guinness who operates the Straffan Steam Museum and hosts the IHAI web page. Details of the committee's membership are given over.

After the formal business, we were treated to a guided tour of the Poolbeg power station by Henry Hudson of the ESB. Dubliners will be familiar with its twin 680ft (207m) chimneys which carry off the boiler exhaust. It opened in 1971 and initially had two 120MW steam-powered turbines by Brown Boveri (Switzerland). A 271MW unit by Alsthom (France) was added in 1978,

bringing its capacity to 511MW - over five times that of the original Pigeon House. At first, the boilers were fired with oil, but since 1984 dual burning with natural gas has also been possible. A 460MW combined cycle gas turbine is now being installed which will raise its output to 971MW, making it Ireland's biggest power generator. Our thanks to Henry for an excellent tour.

Power to the People

This conference took place on 27-28 March under the auspices of Clare Historical and Archaeological Society. Organised by IHAI member Paul Duffy, it included talks on water power (Colin Rynne), wind power (Fred Hamond), steam power (William Dick) and electricity generation (Paul Duffy). On Saturday afternoon, there was a coach tour of local sites, notably the Ardnacrusha hydro-electric power station on the River Shannon near Limerick. This was the first major public works project undertaken by the fledgling State. Conceived by Dr Thomas McLoughlin in 1923, its construction by Siemens Schuckert (Germany) began in 1925. It came on stream in 1929, initially with three Francis turbines; a Kaplan turbine was added in 1934, bringing its output to 85MW (almost the same as Pigeon House).

The station had a profound effect on the nation and its people, enabling a comprehensive programme of rural electrification over the next 25 years. Its impact can be gauged by reading *The Quiet Revolution* by Michael Shiel (Dublin: O'Brien Press, 1984). Still going strong, Ardnacrusha celebrates 70 years of operation this year.

Redundant Mills Regeneration Conference

This annual conference, organised by the GB-based NGCS, comes to Ireland for the first time. The venue is Stewart's Mill, Coalisland, Co Tyrone, recently restored as a visitors' centre by Coalisland & District Development Association Ltd.

The programme starts on Wed 5 May and entails a tour of refurbished mills in the Dungannon area on that afternoon and talks/ workshops on the adaptive reuse of defunct mills on Thursday.
